

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

Inspiring Social Action through Creative Advocacy

The art classroom can serve as an environment in which we can resolve social dilemmas relating culture, power, politics, religion, and gender identity. Art educators can facilitate the transformation of culture through art expression and social engagement (Potash, 2011). Creative art experiences in the classroom can be utilized to communicate individual, social, cultural, and community needs and contribute to social change simultaneously (Potash & Ho, 2011).

With increasing attention and time spent on technology, a need to express individuality through the visual arts is an ever-increasing need. As students' lives become more technologically focused, revisiting social connection and relationships in the art classroom can promote pro-social behavior and social development, skills that are essential for future leaders. Art educators possess a unique role in developing social advocacy in students through the facilitation of creative self-expression. Educators can model collaborative partnerships emphasizing leadership development to inspire student motivation in engaging in powerful art experiences, social justice projects, and community arts-based service learning projects (Tremblay, 2013). Some practical ideas to inspire social advocacy through arts classrooms include: service learning project ideas, student-led art exhibitions emphasizing social justice, and interdisciplinary visual journaling prompts that can be integrated into science, math, social studies, and language arts curricula.

Museum Family & Gallery Guides ... Are They Worth It?

Often it is the case that the Education Departments of Museums are tasked with interpreting the meanings of featured exhibitions and the permanent collection. After interpreting the artwork, it is then our task to communicate the message and experience to visitors—through public programs and often Family and Gallery guides. But are these Family and Gallery guides actually an effective tool for interpreting artwork?

Ellen Cutler, Adjunct Professor of the Maryland Institute College of Art whom has written a number of family guides for the National Gallery of Art in DC states, “There is a belief that guides allow the experience to go home with the child/family and continue through games and activities included in the guide. I am not sure if this isn’t a matter of wishful thinking.”


Before creating a guide, it is important to understand to whom we are marketing. Who are the target audiences? Identifying several potential user groups, based on the market context and any audience research findings, will inform the messages that are developed to communicate about the artwork.

Typically, Family and Gallery guides are either marketed to Young Families or School Groups and Teachers. Young Families are adults 20 to 40 years of age and their children. This group seeks out fun educational activities. School Groups and Teachers are great groups to effectively link information about the art with the school’s curriculum.

But how long does it take to create an effective and educational guide? Once created, what is your budget for printing? Are they being used? William Barclift, Director of Education of The Bascom states, “Being on a tight budget, I have to consider cost-effective ways to engage our audience. We had local woodworkers donate handcrafted wooden clipboards and wood-turned pens, which are mounted on a wooden frame near our front desk so that guests will have quality materials, but they have to return them for reuse. The regular paper stock has not received complaints thus far, but we are careful to make sure that the images and graphics that we print are crisp, high resolution.”

Regardless of your budget, a Family and Gallery guide provides another point of entry for your audience to interpret the artworks. Barry Lord, author of *The Manual of Museum Learning* writes, “*Less is more*, and quality transcends. Making this meaningful for museum learning, and making it work for museum visitors, is the challenge to museum professionals

today. Orientation and interpretation are sorely needed, whereas in other instances the best that they museum educator can do is get out of the way so that the individual museum visitors’ motivations may be met. The museum that succeeds in doing both at once may fairly hope to sustain all sides of its increasingly diverse audience, and provide meaningful museums learning for everyone.”

Nine Ways to Beat the System

I'm still fascinated by retirement (woo-hoo) and have continued to study others' thoughts on the process and to seek out kernels of wisdom to share with my esteemed colleagues. Contributing to a cause larger than one's self is guaranteed to make individuals feel accomplished and valuable.
- 3. Seek New Friendships.** Don't allow your world to shrink to a postage stamp. Planning to be actively involved in your community or select organizations can lead to a vastly expanded social circle. Few people make new friends without leaving their living rooms. You simply have to be resolved to make the effort. An added bonus: Research indicates that maintaining friendships increases longevity.
- 4. Auxiliary Income Always Welcome.** Perhaps part-time work in a related field is right for you. Perhaps you are done with all that, have closed that chapter, and are looking for challenging (or not) activity in some new area. Reports have been circulating that the Baby Boomers especially have been returning to the workforce in record numbers. They try retirement, feel it is too early or doesn't suit them, and go back to work. They have become the unretired.
- 5. Shop in Your Own Closet.** Not wanting to go back to work but feeling a pinch in the pension? One clever former teacher advises others missing the thrill of hunting for bargains to empty their clothes closet. Everyone, she offers, has things—sometimes surprisingly great things-- that can be rediscovered hidden in the far reaches right at home.
- 6. Monitor Your Spirits.** Attitude plays a major role in a successful retirement. (I've personally never had this problem; two years on and I am still celebrating daily.) It pays to be aware. Assess your mood regularly and make adjustments accordingly. If friends and family initiate conversations about your temperament it could be an indication that they are sensing something that you are missing.
- 7. Prepare for a Marathon, Not a 5K.** With lifespans increasing, people are living longer more active lives and you have to prepare to both have many more productive years and to remain as close to primo condition as you can possibly manage. That means it is more important than ever to stay in shape, exercise, remain active, eat properly, and keep the extra pounds off. Feeling good about oneself is essential to a positive outlook and a willingness to try new things. The quality of your life depends upon it.
- 8. Focus Relentlessly on the Positive.** Unlike entertainers, most of us were not in work situations where we received thunderous applause. (Although years ago an art teacher remarked to me that children broke into cheers and applause whenever she arrived at their classroom for their lessons. "I wish my own kids would do that just once for me when I got home," she deadpanned.) It is up to us to focus on the positive and replay the successes and triumphs. I had a file labeled 'good stuff' where I tossed all the certificates, thank you notes, letters, and commendations from throughout the years. On an especially bad day I would take a few minutes to randomly reread some of the great things people had to say. Got me right back on track.
- 9. Collect Experiences, Not Things.** Someone once said you spend the first 50 years collecting things and every year afterwards getting rid of them. He who collects the most toys doesn't win anymore. Chasing experiences makes a lot more sense and sparks lasting memories, sparkling conversations, and opportunities for further new adventures.

We are in the final countdown to the annual FAEA conference. Enormous effort has gone into the planning and execution of this annual event and we thank the many individuals who have spent long hours working to make it a success. Advocacy

This legislative session was the most unusual in recent history. The House adjourned early causing many bills to not move forward. This has not happened in 40 years. Very interesting!

2015 Session Legislative Wrap-Up

HB 7069

- Passed with bipartisan support relatively early in the session.
- Signed into law during the session making it effective immediately.
- Provides testing relief
- Eliminates some required remediation. No Technical Assistance Paper published yet on this issue.
- Sets the school year start date.

Because the session ended prematurely several bills died in committee. This includes:

- Bill that would have empowered parents to choose any school within our outside the district if parents could provide transportation and seats were available.
- FHSAA bill that would have changed significantly current practices and allowed students to participate in FHSAA sports at any school in the state. Bill addressed legislators generalized concerns about FHSAA governance.
- Financial literacy bill would have required students to take 1/2 credit in financial literacy. This would have impacted the number of electives available for arts education.
- Bill that would have allowed guns on school campus.

NOTE: It is likely that all of these bills will be back in the 2016 session

Proposed Changes to the FAEA Constitution

The Florida Art Education Association Board of Directors reviews the Constitution and Bylaws of the Association to ensure they are up to date. A Constitution and Bylaws taskforce was formed and recommended changes for the Constitution were voted on at the May board meeting. The changes were recommended to update in more recent language and format the content. The committee reviewed other association Constitutions and Bylaws, including the National Art Education Association documents. According to the FAEA Constitution all changes are to come before the membership between the first and second readings of the Board of Directors. The General Membership shall vote to approve any Constitutional Amendment by simple majority present at the Annual business meeting. Therefore at the October General Session the committee will bring forth the recommendations for a vote.

2016 Legislative Session

- Session will be early, starting January 12th. Bills have already started to be filed. We all need to be diligent in our efforts to review legislation for the betterment of arts education.

To Do List

- Plan your year to present high quality comprehensive visual arts education in your classroom.
- Communicate your goals and objectives to all stakeholders.
- Become knowledgeable about the national Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA) legislation. It has been passed in the U.S. House H.B. 7 and the Senate version has passed. We are in favor of the Senate Bill and are hopeful that the House will revise their bill to take up some of the Senate's proposals. Keep posted on this important legislation and make your voice heard to both Florida U.S. Senator Bill Nelson and Senator Marco Rubio.
- Know the names and contact information for your school board members, and state representatives.
- Within the first three weeks of school, share a visual arts education success story with your principal, assistant principal, guidance counselor or other decision maker on your campus. Share the good news!
- Be informed and involved.

Answers To Your Conference FAQs



Professional Development, Professionalism and Lifelong Learning



As we look forward to the upcoming school year and before we get caught up in school-wide whirlwind activities and events, we would be wise in taking a few moments first to reflect on the previous year and then ask ourselves the following question, “How can I focus on preparing myself to be the best possible teacher for my students that I can this year?” This is a straightforward question with a straightforward answer—through participating in Professional Development activities and then sharing with others through Professional Learning Communities. The National Staff Development Council (2015) defines professional development as the means of ... “the comprehensive, sustained and intensive approach to improving teachers’ and principals’ effectiveness in raising student achievement.” Along with this, they have created nine standards that serve as the framework for effective professional development. Engaging in professional development learning activities helps foster collective responsibility for professional and instructional practice, stu-

dent achievement, continuous improvement and growth, and the implementation of research-based methodologies in our classrooms.

Too often, the reason educators may participate in professional development is tied to the need for recertification requirements. It should in fact become an intrinsic motivator for one’s sense of professionalism and the desire to become an effective teacher. In the book *Teacher Under Construction: Things I Wish I’d Known!* by Parks (2010, p. 1), the case is made that good teachers may be born with the talent to teach, but “good teachers are made by the experience.” This is born out of the idea that becoming an effective teacher requires opportunities for lifelong learning and professionalism to evolve. As professionals, you should not only consider joining local, state and the national association membership, but also consider participating in and presenting qualitative professional development on these levels and at your school site.



Professional development also entails subscribing to the latest educational literature available. Becoming aware of the latest research to support student achievement and supporting the Florida State Standards for the visual arts and other content areas is vital to understanding what works and what doesn’t. Attending state and national conferences and participating in relevant professional development activities on these levels hones the skills in networking with other professionals. It also helps develop relevant dialogue with contemporaries that can inform us of the latest educational news and legislative updates that affect our classrooms and instructional responsibilities. Consider running for board positions on the local, state, and national levels, as this too is part of professional development and these serve as invaluable experiences that do have a direct

correlation between effective teaching and your professionalism. “In education, research has shown that teaching quality and school leadership are the most important factors in raising student achievement. For teachers and school and district leaders to be as effective as possible, they continually expand their knowledge and skills to implement the best educational practices.” (Mizell, 2010, p. 3)

Teamwork and collaboration are also part of your professional development responsibilities. Mentoring new teachers through Clinical Supervision opportunities broadens the scope of teaching and learning for both mentor and new teacher. Additionally, facilitating workshops at your school site and inviting parents and your colleagues is a way to share in your Professional Learning Communities. As an art educator, what better way is there than to share your wealth of knowledge through your understanding and application of the visual arts standards through project-based or object-based learning activities with your colleagues, parents, administrators, new teachers, and community? These types of professional development activities involve the community and help to raise awareness of the rigorosity of the visual arts, while supporting what you do in the classroom. This all helps to widen the circle of your professional growth and commitment to being a lifelong learner.

In the final analysis, the only thing that stands between you and student success is—you. Glattenhorn (1987) suggests that by gaining experience in one’s teaching role they systematically gain increased experience in their own professional growth through the examination of their teaching ability (p. 32). This is the foundation of professional development and the path to taking ownership for professional growth and instructional accountability. Accepting this responsibility requires seeking out the opportunities to learn, actively applying what’s been learned, and enthusiastically sharing what’s been learned with others. In doing so, you will be laying the foundations for lifelong learning for yourself and for everyone whose life you will touch. ☺



Clyde Butcher

Born in Kansas City, Missouri, Butcher did not always have his eyes set on photography. A childhood hobby of drawing boat designs became a career after he graduated with an architecture degree from California Polytechnic State University.

Butcher began photographing landscapes in black and white and eventually left the architecture field in 1970 to exhibit his photographs at art festivals. Butcher moved to Ft. Meyers, Florida and would later connect on a spiritual level to the Big Cypress National Preserves where he often photographed, finding that it was a place of healing after the death of his son. Butcher destroyed his color photographs and vowed to use only black and white film.

Butcher has received several awards, such as the Artist Hall of Fame Award, the Lifetime Achievement Award from the North American Nature Photography Association, the 2011 Distinguished Artist Award from the Florida House in Washington, D.C. and Humanitarian of the Year for 2005 from the International University.

Butcher has completed several Public Broadcasting programs on the environment of Florida, three of which are award-winning documentaries.

Xavier Cortada

Xavier Cortada, a painter known for his environmentally-oriented artwork. Cortada was born in Albany, New York, but currently resides in Miami where he attended school at the University of Miami, receiving a Bachelor's in Psychology, a Master's in Public Administration, and a Juris Doctor from University of Miami's College of Law.

Cortada is an Artist-In-Residence collaborating with scientists to raise awareness and depict important scientific discoveries. "I'm an artist and science is my muse," Cortada stated at a Tedx Talk given at Florida International University in 2013. Cortada's art pieces are dynamic; as a fellow for the Antarctic Artist and Writer's Program, he used the moving ice sheet beneath the South Pole as an instrument to mark time. The art piece will be completed in 150,000 years.

His art is highly sought after, as he has been commissioned to create art for the White house, the World Bank, the Florida Supreme Court, the Florida Governor's Mansion, and many more. Famous brand names, such as Nike, Heineken, Hershey's, and General Mills have commissioned his art. His works has been seen on National Geographic TV and the Discovery Channel.
